

Village Design Statement

New building is inevitable in every town and village nowadays, and indeed communities need some change in order to live and grow. Proposals for new housing often arouse considerable worries about the form it may take and the effect it may have. A practical answer is for every community to create its own Village Design Statement to manage change positively for the benefit of the whole local community.

A Village Design Statement identifies what features are special or unique to the community and its built heritage. It then delineates these features and makes suggestions as to the kinds of building and change which will enhance the community. When adopted by a local planning authority, a Village Design Statement is a powerful planning tool for the authority and developers alike, suggesting acceptable forms of building and other development.

As this is essentially a statement by the whole community about where they live and work, we need to create a community group, drawing individuals from throughout the parish, and to invite the views of everyone. As a first stage, the Parish Council will circulate a very brief questionnaire to ensure that the village is keen for such a venture – if you care about how the village appears and may develop, your views are **vital**! Without sufficient response we may have to accept what developers thrust upon us!

Planning

A number of planning issues have been raised with the Parish Council recently so it has sought clarification from the Planning Department at East Staffordshire Borough Council for some of the more frequently asked questions:

Lopping/felling of trees within the conservation area — no planning permission is required for these works but anyone intending to do such work is required to notify the Local Planning Authority of the intended works so that the Authority has the opportunity to place Tree Preservation Orders on the tree(s) if necessary.

Replacement windows in the conservation area – there is control of the materials of windows or doors in respect of Listed Buildings only. The Planning Authority can advise any property owner if their building is listed, and what permissions they might require.

Porch extensions – some porches do not require planning permission but any porch within 2 metres of the highway does require planning permission.

The Planning Department is always happy to offer help or advice to homeowners wishing to
