

New Parish Councillors

As only eight candidates were nominated for election on May 1st they were elected without a poll. A ninth councillor has now been co-opted so the nine councillors for the next four years are:

Phil Charles (Chairman 840251), Bob Esling (Vice Chairman 840778), Clive Cook, David Eatough, Alan Elkington, Linda Fox, Roger Jarman, Kate McLoughlin and Jean Needham. Clerk to the Council is Eric Roy (840153). Monthly meetings are held at the Village Hall and the public are welcome to attend. Community First Responder Scheme

Following a very informative visit by Abbots Bromley councillors to view the Headquarters of the Staffordshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust in Stafford, the Council would like to support a "Community First Responder" scheme in our region. The ambulance service do a marvellous job and Staffordshire has one of the best records in the country for response times. To further reduce the response time in rural areas, Staffordshire Ambulance Service are encouraging Parish Councils to support local volunteers as "Community First Responders" (CFR).

After a comprehensive training programme, which takes them to technician level, the CFR attend all emergency calls in their local area, allowing treatment to begin in the vital early minutes before the ambulance crew arrives. The volunteers are equipped with an on-call vehicle, defibrillator and other essential medical equipment. At the April Parish Council meeting Borough Councillor Wimbush gave an outline of how the scheme had been set up in his Weaver ward. A group of 36 volunteers have been trained to give 24 hour cover with the help of initial £30k funding (some from Staffordshire County Council). Bob Lee from Staffordshire Ambulance Service gave further details at our May meeting.

The establishment and operation of a CFR scheme is a major undertaking and will involve a great deal of work. It will only be successful if it is supported by the community that it serves and has enough volunteers to guarantee a continuous service. Anti Social Behaviour

This term is now commonly used to cover a multitude of events that interfere with the day to day lives of communities. How can the police service make a difference and reduce anti social behaviour?

Your community beat officer, PC Richard Boulter, is getting to know your community quite well now and when incidents arise he is often familiar with the circumstances or even the individuals involved. Sometimes a word of advice is sufficient to remedy the situation but where the problem is more deep-rooted such tactics are insufficient and Police Officers are now addressing these issues by applying a problem solving approach, i.e.

What is it about the offenders that make them cause the problems? What is it about the location that means there is a problem there? What is it about the victims that make them a target?

One lesson from this approach is that anti social activities generally affect more than one individual and if a group of victims are prepared to speak out and offer evidence to the police the outcome is always more successful. Now that the Borough Council have appointed a person to assist in co-ordinating action around anti-social behaviour the evidence gathering efforts of the police and community should be more effective.

Damage at Village Hall

The Trustees of the Village Hall would like to appeal to parents to be more vigilant about their teenagers' activities. A number of youths have been causing damage; balls are being kicked against the glass windows, the balcony has been damaged and lights have been tampered with. From now on the Trustees will be taking action by asking parents to pay for any damage caused. Failure to respond will give the Trustees no alternative but to reluctantly report the incidents to the police.

137 Payments

Section 137 of the Local Government Act 1972 enables the Council to spend up to £5.00 per elector for the benefit of people in the area on activities not specifically authorised by any other powers. Grants have been given to the Vital Villages Plan, the Scouts and Guides, Air Ambulance, Staffordshire Wildlife Trust's "Wolseley Appeal" and the Cricket Club.

The Parish Council have also agreed a loan with the Cricket Club to help with the purchase of grass-cutting equipment for the Anglesey Field.
