

Abbots Bromley Youth Club

Contrary to the rumours, we are still alive and well! Despite the withdrawal of Staffordshire Youth Service funding and resource on 31st December, the volunteers of Abbots Bromley Youth Club have committed to maintain a service for young people in our community. We continue to be one of the only youth clubs which remain in operation in Staffordshire, following these cuts.

We have established a new organisation to manage the Youth Club and will look to engage professional services to comply with our safe guarding and health and safety obligations.

We are currently financially viable (for the next year at least), but funding will be a challenge to us and we are very grateful for the support of local organisations such as the Parish Council, Abbots Bromley United Charities and the Village Cricket Club. We would also like to recognise the contribution from the village at large through events such as the Horn Dance and our own Fun Day.

We continue to operate on Tuesday evenings between 7pm and 9pm at the Village Hall throughout the year (we will break occasionally, but advise young people accordingly). We are open to young people of school ages between Year 6 and Year 13. After consideration, we have elected to maintain our subs at the bargain price of 50p (you can save that on the tuck shop alone!) to make the Youth Club as accessible to as many young people as possible.

We plan our sessions around various activities, which include sport, cooking, art & crafts, to name a few. We also have a pool table, WII, table tennis and table football available for our young people.

We have some fantastic volunteers, but we can be stretched at times, and will always welcome more support—either on a regular basis or adhoc. If you have a skill that you could share or impart upon our young people, we would always welcome those contributions.

We were originally established at the request of young people in the village and provide at least one night a week, where there is something to do and a place where young people can meet. We must make sure this facility is not lost to our village—your support is appreciated.

Dear Members of the AB Village Community,

May we please draw your attention to an on-going problem that we are experiencing Whilst we welcome the fact that members of the community take advantage of walking through our beautiful school grounds, whether on the designated Public Footpaths or on the sports fields, it is disappointing that some dog walkers do not always act responsibly by cleaning up after their pet.

Not only are our playing fields used by our own pupils and those of visiting schools, children in the local community also benefit from playing on the fields. It is vital therefore that all dog owners act responsibly by removing dog faeces please. Toxacariasis is an infection in humans which is caused by roundworm parasites found in dog faeces; the serious side effects of such an infection can lead to damage to body organs such as the liver, lungs, eyes or brain!

In drawing this matter to your attention, we very much hope that everyone will be on the look-out to ensure that dog owners behave in a responsible manner.
