Over recent months the Parish Council has received several complaints about the disrepair of stiles, footpaths and bridges in the area. The PC is currently working with Staffordshire County Council to try and improve some of these, however, it is not always possible to identify the location without more detail. If you are out walking either in the village or surrounding fields and come across a stile or path that is not maintained to a safe and passable standard please could you report to Staffordshire County Council via the website https://prow.staffordshire.gov.uk/. If you are not able to do this then please report to the Parish Clerk so that the complaint can be followed up. If you do know the landowner and are able to speak to them then that may be all it takes as they may well not be aware that there is an issue.

Landowners do have a responsibility to maintain access to public rights of way through their land, however, it is equally the responsibility of those using these paths to ensure the safety and wellbeing of animals. The PC has also received several reports of dog fouling on agricultural land and also the leaving of plastic bags in fields or even hung on trees! Diseases found in dog poo can cause abortions in cattle and death in sheep. Even if these animals are not grazing at the time the grass may be cut and fed to them over the winter months.

Dogs should also be kept under control at all times. Even if the dog isn't chasing animals the mere presence of a dog running free can sometimes cause stress. Please also ensure that any gates that are used are closed firmly behind you to ensure that animals do not escape

# **Abbots Bromley Churchyard Fund**

The Parish Council's very helpful community grant of £1000 to Abbots Bromley PCC and the Nostalgia Team jointly has helped kickstart a new project fund for churchyard memorial maintenance.

Many headstones in the churchyard have become unsafe over time and need attention so that they do not become hazardous, and so they also continue to commemorate those whose fascinating stories make up the history of our village.

The Nostalgia Team are working with the PCC to identify stones where families are still living in the local area to give them the opportunity of tending and mending their family memorials. Many families have responded generously and immediately – you may notice some stones which are once again upright, as well as clean and shiny!

However there are some stones belonging to families who no longer live in the area or who have no living relatives. The burden of making these stones safe falls to the PCC so the new fund will contribute to the not inconsiderable cost of this work.

And to illustrate the need for the churchyard fund, Elaine Summers of the Nostalgia Team has researched the story of Joseph Twigg and she writes:

You've probably never noticed the headstone lying flat towards the bank on the west side of the church – this belongs to Mr Twigg and the inscription reads:-

Joseph Twigg died at Hoar Cross
14th January 1870 aged 74 years
Faithful and valued
servant to Hugo Charles
Meynell-Ingram Esq
For 37 years

After researching the census records we found Joseph in 1841 working and living as a servant for Mr Meynell and his family in St James, Golden Square, Middlesex. In 1851 the family were living at Hoar Cross Hall where Joseph was listed as a house servant; by 1861 Joseph is listed as the Butler and was still in this post until his death. There was no church at Hoar Cross until 1876 and Joseph's sister, Hannah Harvey, was buried at Abbots Bromley in 1868. Joseph was buried here on the 19th January 1870.

The reason for telling the story of Mr Twigg is to say we would dearly love to have the headstone standing again and are asking for donations, not just for Mr Twigg, but for the many others that are lying flat or damaged. During lockdown we have been researching many of the names on the headstones and sadly a lot of families have died out. Some headstones have already been repaired or cleaned and have interesting stories to tell.

Our churchyard is a pleasant reflective green space in the centre of the village, which gives pleasure to villagers and visitors alike. To keep it attractive and safe for everyone please help the fund.
